H1N1: Keeping Reedies healthy

Reed's newest class, comprised of 368 freshmen and 41 transfer students, joined more than 600 family members to participate in this year's fall Orientation. The event marked the end of what must have been for them—and certainly was for us—a busy and productive summer. Having focused on everything from personnel and procedural changes to pandemics, we have now begun the 2009–10 academic year, and I am thrilled to say that we're off to a great start. Gray Fund events this semester

The Gray Fund is an endowment that was first established 18 years ago in an effort by a local community member to offer Reedies a chance to get out of the classroom and enjoy themselves. This year, the Gray Fund has already provided students, faculty, and staff with the opportunity to hear Cleve Jones, the iconic gay-rights activist, attend a production of the opera *La Bohème*, and eat Voodoo Donuts, popcorn, and candy while watching *Troy* and the Gus Van Sant film *Milk*. In the upcoming months, students will get to see Sherman Alexie speak on campus, as well as take part in a variety of off-campus excursions including a trip to see the play *Santaland Diaries* in downtown Portland. All **Gray Fund events** are free and open to the Reed community.

students, staff, and scholars throughout this academic year.

The Reed bubble has done little to protect us against either infectious media coverage or the inevitable first cases of assumed H1N1 on campus. At the time of this writing, we have had a handful of cases of what the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) are calling "influenza-like illness" (ILI). Following CDC guidelines, we are not routinely testing ILI cases, so we do not have confirmed H1N1 diagnoses. That said, our colleagues in college and university health services around the country tell us that, based on their experience, we can expect the number of cases to increase significantly as the season progresses. We are responding aggressively to the threat of a widespread outbreak. Reed's Emergency Response Team (ERT) meets regularly to discuss the college's preparations, which include:

- Widely publicized advice on influenza prevention
- Logistical arrangements designed to limit the spread of infection
 - An unoccupied faculty house designated as an isolation space
 - A dedicated assessment and triage area at the health and counseling center
 - Alcohol-based hand cleanser and disinfecting wipes readily available on campus
 - Expanded treatment resources
 - Dedicated communication channels
 - H1N1 hotline in the health and counseling center
 - Web-based and email updates for the entire community

It is our sincere hope that through the collaborative efforts of students, staff, and faculty that we will minimize the impact of H1N1 at Reed.

Important financial aid information

Financial aid applications for the 2010–11 academic year will be available in early December. If your Reedie does not bring home an application packet over winter break, or if you want your own set of application instructions, give us a call at 503/777-7223 or send an email to financial.aid@reed.edu, and we will send one to you. The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and CSS Profile should be filed with the processors by April 1, 2010. Submit the verification worksheet and copies of parent and student 2009 IRS tax returns, 1099, and W-2 statements to the Reed financial aid office by May 1, 2010. Instead of going out for *apéros* at cafés and commuting to a campus that is 45 minutes away by the métro, I am living in Old Dorm Block, in the middle of everything on campus and constantly running back and forth between my room, classes, commons, work, and the library. I am back at Reed for my junior year after a semester abroad in Paris, and I could not be happier to be thrown back into this community where things revolve around learning and following your passion(s).

This semester, I am taking first-year Russian and trying not to mix up the different suffixes, learning to analyze types of word and sentence structures in Morphosyntactic Typology, reading about and listening to various kinds of music in History & Memory in African American Music, and learning all about intervals, scales, and more in music theory. There is always a lot of work to be done, and you'll find me at the library most nights, but I would choose this over having easy classes and not learning, any day.

It's pretty crazy to think that it's already my junior year. I can still remember the first day I set my feet on this campus. I can still remember having to use the campus map to figure out where things were. But now I am an upperclassman who gives advice on which Hum lectures never to miss, I am the only junior in a first-year language class, I am a peer mentor to a new student, I know the spots in the library where you can get cell phone reception

But the thing that hasn't changed since day one at Reed is the amazing group of people that this place attracts. We're all busy with our studies, but a bunch of us do other things that we're passionate about. Some of us play sports, some fix bikes for free, some start student organizations to give out free food, some sit on committees to discuss important things, some start a fantasy-themed dorm
